Highlights of the Year:

- Children's Message takes place and is live-streamed weekly from the Wiggles and Wonder Space.
- Adult Sunday School averaged 10-15 people per session.
- Teacher recognition/graduation Sunday recognized 7 graduates from middle school, high school and college.
- Coordination of Sunday School Teachers, Child Care workers, and Sunday School lessons via shared Google/Excel docs.
- Sent/delivered 14 care packages to our college and graduate school students during fall semester exams.
- A Coffee House led by youth in the spring was well-attended by children, youth and adults.
- Eight Sunday School families participated in the Christmas Eve Pageant.
- 2nd -5th grade class, and the youth class allocated \$500 approved from Mission Budget to local charities.
- The Frog Group moved to Wonka Room in Fall 2024. The Youth moved to the back balcony in the Sanctuary. The Wonka Room will continue to be a Youth Space for all.
- CE hosted a table at National Night Out in Frick Park, and helped children from the community make native animal KeyChains.
- The Waverly Mini Opera House for Pre-K -5th grades debuted on Sundays in June with activities and a stellar ending performance. Waverly Youth assisted in coaching and directing.
- 3 Summer Camp Scholarships were awarded for children and youth to attend Camp Crestfield.
- A Theology Talk Tuesday was held on Faith and Politics.

Waverly's outreach efforts are guided by the following Mission Statement and being a Matthew 25 PC(USA) congregation.

"The Mission Committee affirms that Waverly is a church committed to making God's unconditional love real in the lives of people inside and outside our community. We live out our mission through joyful and reverent worship, welcoming fellowship, open minded study, and working to bring out SHALOM –just and lasting peace – in our community, nation and world. We commit, as part of our Mission work, and as a Matthew 25 church, to seek justice for those most marginalized in our world. We further commit to the anti-racist work of fighting white supremacy, dismantling institutionalized racism, and repairing broken relationships. The Mission Committee seeks out opportunities for Waverly's members to become God's hands, feet and face to our neighbors by ministering to people's basic needs for food, shelter, education, healthcare, safety, equal justice under law, and spiritual growth. Our strategy includes financial and hands-on assistance, partnerships with other organizations, and participation in civil political discourse." (Mission Statement, October 2020)

Matthew 25 congregations build congregational vitality by challenging themselves to deepen their faith and actively and joyfully engage with their community and the world; dismantling structural racism by advocating and acting to break down the systems, practices and thinking that underlie discrimination, bias, prejudice and oppression of people of color; and eradicating systemic poverty by working to change laws, policies, plans and structures in our society that perpetuate economic exploitation of people who are poor.

Distributions and Activities:

Distributions

Ten percent of the dollars pledged to Waverly each year are directed to the Mission budget. In 2024, the Mission Committee allocated \$19,556. The funds were allocated in support of local, national, and global mission partners.

The committee paid \$1,000 as a second of three annual payments toward a \$3,000 pledge (over 3 years) to support our long-time ministry partner, the Crestfield Camp and Conference Center.

Activities

- **Pride Events.** On June 1st, Waverly representatives joined our LAMP (LGBTQ+ Affirming Ministries of Pittsburgh) partners at the Pittsburgh Pride March and Celebration.
- Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank. On June 13, seven volunteers from Waverly worked a shift in the **Volunteer Engagement Center**, inspecting, sorting, and repackaging donated food and beverages.
- Black Presbyterian Caucus. Waverly participated in the Caucus' Juneteenth parade on June 15.

- <u>Wilkinsburg Sanctuary Project for Peace.</u> Rev. Caitlin serves as a chaplain and on the board of the Project and members participated in the Martin Luther King Jr. Day Vigil, the Art and Talent Show, and the Pancakes for Peace breakfast.
- Open Hand Ministry. Volunteers from Waverly continue to work with Open Hand Ministries. Bill Vandivier
 organized a Waverly team of 10 that gave a day of service on July 13th, to work on the Ministries' 423 Ardary
 Street property. In addition to this work day, Bill Vandivier and Jim Crawford also worked on this house on
 other days throughout the year.
- CROP Hunger Walk for Church World Service. The walk was held on October 13th. The Mission Committee contributed \$2,500 and Waverly's team of 9 raised an additional \$6,468. Combined, Waverly contributed \$8,968 toward this year's walk which raised over \$27,514 in support of Church World Service and Wilkinsburg Community Ministry.

Personnel Committee

The Committee held several meetings as needed toward the end of the year in regard to staff evaluations. There were no meetings held on a regular ongoing basis, however, staff was approached as to their work circumstances regularly throughout the year. The Personnel Committee was established to create and oversee all policies relating to Waverly's staff and to maintain all personnel records. The committee helps with the hiring of staff and contract workers, provides the resources for annual reviews (e.g., job descriptions, work plans and evaluation forms), and makes compensation recommendations to the session. Staff evaluations were conducted during the fourth quarter of 2024. Feedback was provided to all employees by the end of November. It is an important goal of the Personnel Committee to provide everyone working on behalf of Waverly opportunities for continued growth.

Major accomplishments and/or activities in 2024 consisted of the following:

- The Rev. Caitlin Werth completed her fourth full year as Waverly's pastor on August 1, 2024. She received a 5% increase in salary in 2024 and is scheduled to receive a 5% increase in salary for 2025. Pursuant to Presbytery and BOP revisions, Rev. Werth's pension and benefit packages were adjusted accordingly. Rev. Werth has done a wonderful job of shepherding Waverly and has met the goals for 2024 that she established. We thank her for her outstanding service.
- Caitlin Zeist completed her one-year position as Student Pastor in May 2024. She worked closely with Rev. Werth throughout her year. Caitlin was compensated at the Presbytery salary level for Student Pastors. Caitlin did an outstanding job in her capacity as Student Pastor.
- Caitlin Zeiset provided a full year of service to Waverly as Director of Children and Youth Ministry. In addition to her Student Pastor compensation Caitlin was compensated commensurate with what a full-time position would be paid for a 10-hour work week in a similar position. Caitlin has worked with Rev. Werth and the Christian Education committee to develop programs which will attract and enhance our ministry to children and youth. She has done a wonderful and innovative job.
- Jennifer Geibel completed her third year as Waverly's Director of Music in September. She accompanies the choir
 on the piano and organ thus eliminating the need for a salaried accompanist. Jennifer is compensated as a salaried
 employee and paid on a monthly basis. She is scheduled to receive an increase in pay in 2024 commensurate with
 what a full-time position would pay for a 10-hour work week. Waverly is fortunate to have Jennifer as its Director of
 Music now and for the foreseeable future.
- Mary Cullen was hired in February to the position of Office Administrator. She was hired on a salary basis for a
 ten-hour work week commensurate with the current wage for such a position. Mary has been a tremendous asset
 for Waverly allowing Rev. Werth to focus more on her position as pastor.
- Jill Ramsey completed her second full year as Childcare Supervisor in September. Allison Butterfield ended her
 one-year position as Childcare Assistant in August. Both Jill and Allison were paid on an hourly basis. Jill will receive
 an increase in her hourly rate of approximately 5% for 2025. Belle Werth was hired in October as Childcare
 Assistant at an hourly rate. All childcare staff provided a caring and secure environment for the youngest members
 of Waverly's family.
- Special thanks to Tom Fisher who has provided grounds maintenance service on a volunteer basis again in 2024. Tom has agreed to provide lawn and grounds service on a volunteer basis again in 2025.
- Thanks to the many volunteers who bring us live streaming worship services on a weekly basis. This service will continue in 2025.

We look forward to 2025. We trust that those people who receive financial compensation from Waverly for serving our church receive God's blessings and our continued support. We thank all the individuals mentioned in this report for their service and creativity this past year.

The Property Committee met early in the year to set priorities for the year taking into account the funds available, the results of last fall's congregational Building survey and the needs of the Building.

A large tree above the Briar Cliff parking lot fell into the parking lot during a brief windstorm on Friday, Feb. 16. The tree and associated debris was removed that afternoon by members of the Committee and Pastor Caitlin. A second tree was removed for safety reasons by Jonathan Wasko, continuing his multi-year work of improving the Briar Cliff hillside.

The Committee also voted to approve a two-year extension of the Memorandum of Understanding with Shadyside Academy regarding their use of Waverly (and our use of Shadyside Academy) as a safe place for people to relocate in the event of an emergency.

In addition to regular mowing and snow removal, landscaping work included improvement to the gardens and surrounding vegetation. A three sisters garden was planted, which provided education and a small amount of produce and enhanced the Braddock Ave. front yard.

Mary Vandivier and Pattie Relosky led the organization of the outdoor shed.

Pointing around the stones on the Briar Cliff upper wall corrected water infiltration in the choir loft and chancel area.

Workdays were held on April 27th and November 9th.

New tenants began occupying the office behind the Sanctuary on June 1st.

Jim Lenkner installed a more permanent screen and projector, and is working on a sound system in our Social Hall. A showing of the movie "It's a Wonderful Life" was a success.

We upgraded our facilities for safety and accessibility by installing new doors and a stair lift into the Social Hall, updating the bathrooms to all-gender, updating lighting in the Kitchen, Social Hall and stairwell, and repairing the lower Forbes Ave./Braddock Ave. steps, Social Hall steps, and main front steps.

Flooding in the Social Hall restroom and entry door was corrected by snaking. Regular preventive snaking is needed to prevent future flooding.

Session increased budgeted hours for Nancy Lindahl and expanded her job description for Cleaning Services.

The annual inspection of our fire alarm and emergency lighting system was completed in December.

Regular maintenance was provided on the heating system.

In 2024, Waverly's mission and ministry, as well as numerous additional mission outreach entities, were generously supported with the time, talents, and financial resources of many households. This past year Waverly could not have accomplished all that it did without this generous level of enthusiastic support it received from its members and friends.

In May, Waverly received a bequest from Louise Mohn's estate of \$1,120,319 paid in increments over the course of the year. Louise died in January at the age of 100. Of the total funds received \$400,000 went to a fixed annuity yielding a 5.4% return for 7 years (\$21,600/year). \$489,720 was transferred into Brown Advisory investments. \$295,000 will be invested in the first quarter of 2025 in Delaware Life annuity yielding a 5% return for 5 years (\$14,500). Additionally, Waverly transferred its endowment funds of \$64,720 from the Presbyterian Foundation to Brown Advisory. All investments will be made in accordance with PC(U.S.A.) and Waverly investment guidelines.

As Waverly proceeds into 2025, it is hoped that Waverly will continue to enjoy this support. We believe this generosity is representative of our collectively joy-filled and grateful response for God's steadfast love, grace, faithfulness and generosity. Praise God from whom all blessings flow.

The Worship and Music Committee works with the Pastor to ensure we offer spaces for reflection, redemption, and responsiveness. We strive to be inclusive and provide a sense of belonging to all those who seek to community with Christ. "Love Thy Neighbor-No Exceptions."

In 2024, worship and music continues to be a way that congregants engage in the church.

- We continue to make beautiful offerings through voice and instrument. We are also blessed to have a
 multi-generational group of musicians and vocalists who grace us with their talents and gifts. Musical contributions
 to worship services are always welcome!
- We had in-person worship all year in 2024. We thank those who run sound and video, which allows members, friends, and guests to join Waverly's worship services remotely. It also supports those who may struggle with reading on the page to participate via our big screen.
- Communion is celebrated every Sunday that an ordained minister is available to serve. Pre-package cups and
 wafers are provided in the pews for those who may not be able to or feel comfortable with Intinction. We
 encourage all congregants to participate in this central worship sacrament in the way in which they are most
 comfortable. We also provide masks during services for those concerned with continuing the spread of illness.
- Every Sunday, the children of Waverly gather and participate in worship by way of the Wiggles and Wonder space. While there, they are provided with a Children's Message. Caitlin Zeiset plans and delivers these messages most often; however, we have had Jean Byrd and Kellie Skweres fill in when necessary, in her absence.
